

37.6% of children Living below federal poverty level


*55% of children Living below ALICE survival threshold





How One Program Can Help

기가 newreach Stable Families Program

- 1. Work on-site in public housing
- Identify and outreach families who are in or on the verge of crisis
- Assess and triage to stabilize tenancies and prevent eviction and homelessness
- 4. Provide case management to build sustainable housing stability



Who We Serve

Program Entry Criteria:

- Head of household over the age of 18
- Reside in Bridgeport public housing
 - > public housing units
 - > Section 8 subsidized housing
 - other deeply subsidized housing that the housing authority has developed
- In or on the verge of crisis and willing to access services to stabilize their tenancies and avert eviction




3 pronged case management approach



Outreach and identification

What constitutes a crisis?

- Notice to Quit issued
- Behind in Rent
- Poor history of rental payment
- No source of income
- Violence in the household
- Child neglect or Child Protective Services (CPS) involvement
- Criminal activity/legal issues
- Unmet mental health needs
- Unmet behavioral health treatment
- Cognitive impairment
- Health/safety issues
- Gang violence
- School truancy



Case Management Focus Areas


- - **Crisis Mitigation**

Services and Referrals


- Opening a bank account
- Advocating with utility companies for service, i.e. payment plans
- Guardianship issues
- Childcare and parenting resources
- Medical/Primary care
- Dental care
- Mental health, substance abuse and needed health and human services counseling
- Basic Needs Access (food pantry, bus tokens, clothing)
- Finding daily activities, volunteer work




Program Outcomes 2009-2015



Number of Individuals Served






95% of families served have avoided eviction




Program Outcomes 2014-2015




Change in Acuity







322 families, including


484 children have

HA Eviction proceedings decreased from **58 to 18** over last fiscal year, saving the HA \$46,228.





- Affordable and appropriate housing is the foundation of improved health, social, and economic success, for families and communities


